The Program

In the first year, a progressive sequence of courses gives you the theoretical foundation required for solid counseling skills and develops your capacity for self-reflection and empathy.

In the second year, you begin 15-20 hours a week of practicum. This hands-on training puts developing skills to work in a supervised setting, while on-going coursework offers advanced theoretical and practical grounding. Professional counseling is fundamentally relationship based, and our program encourages you to develop the rapport-building skills that will help your clients make important changes in their lives. The program prepares you to work effectively with individuals and families with diverse needs and backgrounds. You will explore the impact of factors such as age, ethnicity, gender, socioeconomic status, and sexual orientation on your clients' lives and the therapeutic relationship.
