Workshop Description:

This workshop will provide an overview of ethical, legal and risk management issues in the use of telepsychology to provide services and supervision during (and after) the COVID-19 pandemic. Telepsychology has become crucial to the delivery of care and training during a period of sheltering-in-place, and will likely continue to play a major role once this public health emergency has passed. Participants will develop an understanding of the intra- and inter-state challenges of remote services, and steps to use in managing those challenges. The knowledge gained will assist participants in developing and maintaining competence during an era of rapid technological, social and public health changes.

After completing this workshop, participants will be able to:

- Describe key challenges posed by telepsychological services
- Summarize three steps to reducing the risks of remote care
- Apply telepsychological instruction and supervision intended to reduce stress and improve learning
- Recognize aspects of HIPAA that have and have not been relaxed to address patient needs during COVID-19.
