### Workshop Description:

This workshop includes two parts 1) Working with Supervisees Who Do Not Meet Professional Competence Requirements and 2) Multiculturalism and Diversity in Clinical Supervision. It is vital for Clinical Supervisors to be able to conceptualize supervisee competence problems and evaluate competence. In part one of this workshop, attention will be paid to managing systems, policies and procedures, transparency, and confidentiality, implementing remediation plans, and prevention of supervisee competence problems, with an emphasis on creating a culture of competence.

Diversity in the field of Psychology is constantly growing and changing. It is vital for Clinical Supervisors to be multiculturally aware. Part 2 of this workshop lays the groundwork for multiculturally competent supervision by focusing on the ways in which such supervision is an ethical imperative and consistent with the competencies movement and guidelines on the provision of effective supervision. Attention will be paid to multicultural supervision competencies and relevant techniques (e.g., forging a strong supervisory relationship, focusing on the triadic relationship, enhancing multicultural awareness, and addressing power dynamics).

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### Instructor Bio:



Nadine J. Kaslow, Ph.D., ABPP is a Professor, Vice Chair for Faculty Development, and Director of the Atlanta Trauma Alliance, Emory University School of Medicine Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences; Chief Psychologist, Grady Health System; and Director of Postdoctoral Residency Training, Emory University School of Medicine. In 2012, she received a Doctorate of Humane Letters from Pepperdine University. The 2014 President of the American Psychological Association (APA), she is President of the APA's Division of Psychologists in Public Service (Division 18). Dr. Kaslow is Past President of APA's Divisions of Clinical Psychology (12), Family Psychology (43), and Psychotherapy (29), as well as the American Board of Clinical Psychology and the American Board of Professional Psychology. She is the Former Chair & Board Member Emeritus of the Association of Psychology Postdoctoral and Internship Centers (APPIC). She was the Editor of the Journal of Family Psychology from 2008-2014. Dr. Kaslow was a Primary Care Public Policy Fellow through the United States Public Health Service, a fellow of the Executive Leadership in Academic Medicine Program, and a Fellow of the Woodruff Leadership Academy. She has received numerous awards including APA's Distinguished Contributions for Education and Training Award, an APA Presidential Citation for assisting displaced interns and postdoctoral fellows in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina, APPIC's Award for Excellence in Postdoctoral Training, a Heiser Award for her legislative advocacy efforts, the Elizabeth Hurlock Beckman Award for inspiring her junior colleagues to develop effective programs in the community, the Grady Health Foundation's Inspiring Mentor Award, Emory University's Thomas Jefferson Award, and a Distinguished Member of Psi Chi – the International Honor Society in Psychology. The recipient of multiple federal and foundation grants, she has published over 300 articles and three books. A member of Rosalynn Carter's Mental Health Advisory Board, she is a nationally recognized expert in psychology education and training and clinical supervision, leadership development, suicide and depression, and family violence. Dr. Kaslow is the psychologist for the Atlanta Ballet and a frequent media guest.

- Demonstrate one specific approach that can be used to have a difficult conversation
- Critique existing approaches for managing systems, policies and procedures, transparency, and confidentiality
- Explain two strategies and discuss their implementation for intervening with supervisees with competence problems
- Describe a communitarian-based culture of competence that fosters optimal handling of supervisees with problems of professional competence
- Identify supervision guidelines related to diversity
- Develop a framework for conceptualizing multicultural supervision competencies related to ADDRESSING+
- Discuss the challenges associated with multicultural supervision and explain strategies for addressing multicultural issues in supervision with humility, empathy, and an appreciation of culture in self and others
